# Making sense of inequality

It is indeed interesting to know that public aspirations and a hope untilled in the value of equality and despair or frustration which is reflected in the widening gaps of inequality, find their articulation in the official policy discourse of the Government of India. The recent report on the state of inequality prepares by the Economic Advisory Council to the Prime Minister represent this official discourse about inequality in India. Way back in 2008, the United Progressive Alliance government constituted a committee of experts to establish an Equal Employment Opportunity commission in India. The UPA government, however, took a rather and unusual step in giving an institutionalizing expression to the principle of equality of opportunity that was to be followed by both the government as well as the private sector. The UPA Government's efforts at taking this first step, in fact, did assume only an indirect acknowledgement of the problem of inequality. This, by consequence, made inequality an empirical grotesque reality to subsume in the affirmative language of equality of opportunity. Although the UPA, under the aegis of the EEOC, made equality as the frontal question, it nonetheless pushed inequality in the background. The EEOC, envisioned during the UPA, thus suggested a possible road map of putting equality before in equality.

As the report of the EAC- PM suggests, the present government intends to start from the point of putting in equality in the fore front and equality in the background. Although there is an acknowledgement of inequality as the report tense to suggests, the report's implementation by the government would certainly face formidable challenges. This article shed some critical light on the challenges the government in power is likely to phase should it take the implementation of the recommendations of the report seriously. Besides, this government's intention to address the question of inequality also gives us the impression that the issue of inequality could be solved primary by the government's intervention and that market may not

matter much in reducing in equality. However, we need to take a much broader view of inequality that operates through the complex modalities.

A ground plan for sustainable mass employment.

The big budget announcement of five major employment related schemes sounds impressive. The schemes are to have an ambitious ₹2 lakh crore outlay spread over five years to facilitate jobs and skilling and the other opportunities for 4.1 crore youth. The Economic Survey has made a strong case for employment, goading the private sector to create jobs, the reasons being lower taxes since 2019, and higher profits post the COVID-19 pandemic. The Prime Minister's package for employment must be seen along with the other initiatives for human well-being.

Any evidence-based road map for sustainable mass employment with dignity must begin by recognising the race to the bottom on wages, when unlimited unskilled workers are available. Let us not forget that the Periodic Labour Force Survey 2019-20 had found that a wage earner is in the top 10% if he/ she earns ₹25,000 a month. Short-duration skill programs have had low long-term placements. This is often on account of wage being low for a life of dignity in urban areas. Many went a back to their villages to do something else.

Evidence also points to the continuum of education and skills. Monthly per capita consumption is the highest in States such as Tamil Nadu, Kerala Himachal Pradesh, Goa and Sikkim. These States have a better human development indicator as well. Odisha, in spite of pushing short duration skilling, has a low per capita consumption in the absence of robust higher secondary/higher/ vocational opportunities in institutions.

Mass employment with dignity requires productivity increases. While it is fine for the Economic Survey to urge the private sector to create jobs, it must be understood that the state also has a role in determining the floor rate of wages and in assuring high quality public goods. There is enough evidence that public employment for unit of population in India is much lower than what it is in most of the developed the world. What should the key policy initiatives in creating sustainable mass employment with the dignity be?
